Research has proven that children who read for fun, achieve more across the whole curriculum. So, what can we do to fulfil our moral obligation to give our children the best possible life chances?

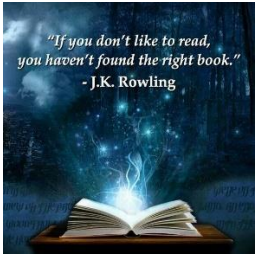
How can I ensure my child reads?

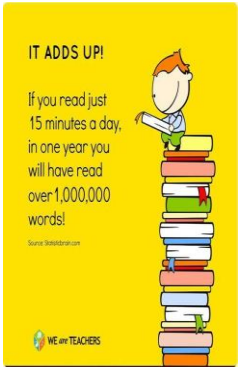
Set aside a regular time and make it a habit. Vary your reading material, reading is reading whether it is a comic, a gaming magazine or a newspaper article. If reading is treated as a top priority by you, your child will follow. If they see you reading, then they will follow. A love of reading is our main aim.

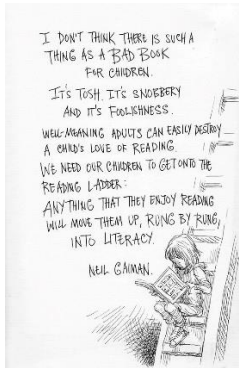
What are the right questions to ask?

Whether a child is beginning to learn the basics of decoding or is a fluent reader, we still need to ensure that they are understanding what they are reading. In order to achieve this, the questions we ask as adults are crucial. Reading at school is split into six main areas including: vocabulary, inference, prediction, explanation, retrieval and summarising. In this booklet, you will find some question stems to help you ask the right type of questions depending on what skill your child needs to work on. When a child comes across a new word when reading with you, make it a habit that you look the word up together in a dictionary, make a note of it and check they remember the meaning the next day, if possible try and use it in everyday conversations to consolidate the meaning.

If your child is a competent reader, it might not be appropriate to ask individual questions once they have read to themselves. An alternative here would be to read the same book as your child and discuss the plot, characters, thoughts and ideas as you both read the book. There are some great books out there which you may well be missing out on!
